Burning Without a Fire Permit
(from the Ministry of Natural Resources' web site)

If you have woody debris or grass to dispose of, the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) strongly suggests composting or using a chipper. But if you must burn, the MNR would like to remind you that there are regulations that must be followed as outlined in the Forest Fires Prevention Act.

These regulations are in effect from April 1st to October 31st each year. The regulations directly affect you if you live in an area governed by the Forest Fires Prevention Act (see map) and if your local municipality does not have more stringent open burning by-laws in place. If your local municipality does have more stringent open burning by-laws than what is described here, you must follow those rules.

Except in a Restricted Fire Zone (where no open burning is permitted under any circumstance), a fire may be started if conditions allow the fire to burn safely until extinguishment and all necessary steps are taken to tend, control and extinguish the fire. A person failing to burn safely can be held responsible for the cost of putting out the fire (should it escape) and for any property damage.

You can burn piled wood, brush, leaves or wood by-products without a fire permit provided you meet all the following conditions:

- The fire is ignited no sooner than two hours before sunset and extinguished no later than two hours after sunrise.
- Only a single pile is burned at any one time.
- The pile is not more than two metres in diameter and less than two metres high.
- The fire is at least two metres from any flammable materials.
- You have tools or water adequate to contain the fire to the fire site.
- A responsible person tends the fire until it is extinguished.

You can burn piled wood, brush, leaves or wood by-products in an incinerator, without a fire permit, provided you meet all of the following conditions:

- The incinerator is an enclosed device constructed entirely of noncombustible material.
- The incinerator is covered by a screen having a mesh size of not more than five millimetres.
- The incinerator is at least five metres from any forest or woodland.
- The incinerator is at least two metres from any flammable material.
- A responsible person monitors the fire until it is extinguished.

You can burn areas of grass or leaf litter on land you lawfully occupy or give permission to burn grass and leaf litter on land you lawfully occupy, without a fire permit, provided you meet all of the following conditions:

- The fire is ignited no sooner than two hours before sunset and extinguished no later than two hours after sunrise.
- The total area to be burned does not exceed one hectare.
- The flaming edge of the fire does not exceed 30 metres in length.
- A responsible person tends the fire until it is extinguished.
- You have tools or water adequate to contain the fire to the fire site.

If you have a requirement to burn outside these conditions, contact your local municipality or the nearest Ministry of Natural Resources office.

Water Quality

Hello again, and I hope everyone had a great Christmas and is enjoying the wintry season. We were out to the camp a few days ago, and the lake was busy with people ice fishing, sledding, and cross-country skiing. It is nice to see the lake being used in all four seasons, which brings me to the importance of maintaining good water quality in the lake.

Back in November, 2001, at the Annual General Meeting, there was a strong interest in forming a committee to look at testing and tracking the water quality of the lake. I volunteered to head up the committee; as well, others were interested in helping.

Because of the Walkerton incident, many communities have great concerns as to the quality of their own water, both from the tap and in their lakes. The City of Greater Sudbury formed a committee, in 2000, to look at the many lakes in the region and test their pH and numerous metal levels. Testing the lakes for total coliform and e-coli was not part of the testing. Lake Panache is one of the 50 lakes in the survey, and it fared very well.

Lana McKinnon was hired, by the city, as Co-ordinator of the Lake Water Quality Program and as a resource for all the camp and lake associations in the region. She was a guest speaker at our Summer General Meeting back in July where she spoke on the water quality issues. One of those issues was the level of coliform and e-coli in the water. She made suggestions on the different methods of testing, the frequency, and where to have the samples tested.

Between 1964 and 1986 the Sudbury Health Unit was testing the lake for coliform and e-coli at many sample points, but that effort was discontinued mainly due to costs. The results from past testing are consistent with the results from our own testing which started in late July, this past summer. We used sample points that had been established from the Health Unit's testing. The first set of ten samples were taken from an eight mile stretch starting from Lavase Creek heading west along the north shore. There were two more sets of samples taken in the month of August. All the test results fell well below the Health Canada Guidelines for Recreational Water Quality and are very encouraging. Bacteriological results can vary hour to hour or day to day depending mainly on the weather, e.g., a heavy rain or a windy day.

The cost for testing each sample is approximately \$15.00, so a set runs at about \$150.00 plus tax. Your Campers' Association will continue sampling and testing the water in Lake Panache and trending the results. I stress that on-going testing of the same locations is imperative to verify results.

All Addresses

If a camper wants to know what their civic address would be for 911 service they can contact Leo Paul Trotter at 671-2489 extension 2432. This service is tied into the Bell system and the camper would have to have a Bell phone installed in the camp (not a cell phone) so that when they call 911 their address is shown automatically on our fire dispatch computer screen. It should be noted that we can only provide reliable fire service to those camps that have roads capable of handling our fire trucks.

In regards to those camps that are on the Whitefish First Nation, the numbering is the responsibility of the Band Council and any questions you have will have to be directed to them as we did not do the addressing for that area.
